Land Acknowledgement

Yorklands is situated on the Treaty and traditional lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation who are part of the Anishinabek peoples, and the traditional territories of the Haudenosaunee as well as the Attiwonderonk (Neutral) peoples. We recognize that for thousands of years the local Indigenous peoples were excellent stewards of this land and that once Europeans came and colonialism set in, great harms were committed. More recently the establishment of the Ontario Reformatory and later the Correctional Centre, more harms were perpetrated as many of the inmates incarcerated were of Indigenous ancestry. Yorklands works to bring greater understanding to the wider community through its programming and by providing opportunities for healing while we work to preserve the site. We stand humbled and privileged to be able to be able to work and live in these territories. We are deeply respectful and thankful to First Nations, Metis and Inuit people who have cared for these lands since time immemorial and who continue to contribute to the strength of Guelph and Ontario and to all communities across the Country.

Our mission is to open green doors to the future by promoting sustainable conservation, environmental education and public enjoyment at the former Guelph Correctional Centre (GCC) lands.

However, we have taken proactive steps to address this issue, including engaging with Infrastructure Ontario and exploring community-led initiatives to restore the wall.

Advocacy and Achievements: Our advocacy efforts have yielded significant results, with over 3,000 signatures collected for a petition to establish the Yorklands site as a national urban park. This milestone underscores the widespread support for our cause and the importance of preserving the natural and cultural heritage at the site.

Opportunities and Initiatives: In 2023, we embraced new opportunities by assuming responsibility for organizing Seedy Saturday and the Tree Mobile program, previously headed by Transition Guelph. We also introduced an Indigenous cultural humility training for the Board and members of Urban Park Guelph facilitated by Chloe Blair.









